reading block during which the teacher provides
support for small, flexible groups of beginning
readers. The teacher helps students learn to use
reading strategies, such as context clues, letter and

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sound knowledge, and syntax or word structure, as they read a text or book that is unfamiliar to them.

What is Guided Reading? - Fountas and Pinnell
In guided reading, children are grouped according to ability and should be given books suited to that reading ability. The teacher uses multiple copies of the text, having her own copy and each individual in the group having a copy. Children then read independently; not in unison or taking turns.

What Are the Advantages & Disadvantages of Guided Reading ...

For the teacher, guided reading means taking the opportunity for careful text selection and intentional and intensive teaching of systems of strategic activity for proficient reading (Fountas & Pinnell, 1996). After systematic assessment to determine their strengths and needs, students are grouped.

The validated research shows that guided out loud reading has significant beneficial impact on word recognition, fluency and comprehension across a range of grade levels. Guided reading benefits both good and struggling readers. In contrast, silent independent reading may not actually improve reading skills for beginning readers.

This is guided reading, after all. In advance, prepare a teaching point, discussion questions, and (if desired) an extension such as word work or guided writing. Before the students begin reading, introduce the text.

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Guided reading is all about getting kids actually reading. It's practice for independent reading! And because guided reading is taught in a small group setting (rather than whole group), you can more easily give each student the support she needs as she progresses along her journey to become a skilled independent reader.

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The Importance of Rereading Rereading consists of on-going and repeated encounters with a text, guided by a particular task so that segments of the text get revisited and rethought.

Guided reading is part of the literacy block: While you're working with one guided reading group, the rest of your students will be busy, too. Ultimately, they must be able to work productively — without your assistance — for 20 minutes or longer.

Strategies for Getting Started With Guided Reading ...

The practice of guided reading is based on the belief that the optimal learning for a reader occurs when they are assisted by an educator, or expert 'other', to read and understand a text with clear but limited guidance. Guided reading allows students to practise and consolidate effective reading strategies.

An important part of guided reading is the repeated reading of a text, every day for a week, reading for a different purpose each time.
